CHARACTER DEFICIENCIES LEADING TO RELEASE

1 Indulgence in Alcohol

Habitual over indulgence in alcohol to such an extent that he becomes a disciplinary problem and cannot be trusted in the performance of his duty.

2 Drug Adiction

Habitually uses opiates or barbiturates so that the adiction has such a hold on him as to effect his reliability in his job performance.

3 Homosexuality

An adjudged homosexual is unsuitable for service, primarily from the danger of perversion of others in barrack life and secondarily from a security point of view.

4 Defiance of Service Discipline

There are those who are not amenable to discipline, who continually disobey orders, these people are unsuitable for service from a job performance point of view as well as security.

5 Habitual Criminality

A history of a number of crimes committed over an extended period without positive evidence of rehabilitation. Such persons are dangerous in the service; a pattern of criminality has been established and will probably continue regardless of what walk of life the person takes.

6 Habitual Association with Known Criminals

A person who habitually associates with known criminals does so for a purpose and the purpose must be assumed to be illegal in the absence of positive evidence to the contrary. A person with an illegal purpose is unsuitable for service.

7 Debts

A person who is unable to manage his affairs and is continually unable to meet his obligations becomes a burden on the service, and a charge on the Benevolent Fund. If after assistance and counselling the person is still unable to meet his financial obligations this person becomes unsuitable for service.

8 Proven or Manifested Dishonesty

A person who contracts debts with no intention to pay, or a person who betrays a trust by embezzeling funds from his employer. 8

9 Insanity

A person adjudged insane or having a serious mental illness is unsuitable for service.

10 Immoral Conduct

Immoral conduct such as prostitution, incest, and indeed assault
