Dear Mr. Jeffery:

The A/N visited my office on Thursday February 7th.

[REDACTED] At present he is an Airforce Officer stationed at [REDACTED] performing the duties of a personnel selection officer. He indicated that he enlisted in the R.C.A.F. in 1941, served as a pilot and has continued in the service since that time.

Mr. [REDACTED] gives a history of being a homosexual. These patterns have been overt for the past 12 years. There is as well a history of intermittent homosexual activities in his early teens. I am impressed that this chap has definite homosexual trends, which he has been able to suppress so that they did not interfere with his inter-personal relationships in the R.C.A.F. but the tensions resulting from such is gradually mounting. I do feel that continuing his work in such an environment will excite and aggravate his sexual feelings and these feelings are likely to provoke him to homosexual activity with the men he is working with. Such an occurrence, especially on the part of an officer will not only be detrimental to him, but as well liable to affect the morale of the group he is connected with. Such people usually make a far better adjustment outside of service life.
